Report of Board of Directors Meetings Yvonne Locke, Secretary, NE/AER

March 2, 2012

The Board of Directors met on March 2, 2012. The 2012 NE/AER Conference Committee updated the board on the progress of planning the conference. It will be held in Newport, RI. More information will be forthcoming as it is made available. The BOD continued the discussion about a microphone to help make teleconferencing more accessible. The bylaws were discussed and division and committee reports reviewed.

Legislative Committee Report Claudia Pattison, Chair

National Legislation introduced 2/28/2012

Prescription Drug Labeling Promotion Act of 2012, HR 4087. Introduced by Congressman Edward J. Markey (D.Mass.). This bill is to ensure that people who are blind or visually impaired have full access to the information included on their prescription drug labels. This legislation convenes a working group of pharmacy representatives, patient and consumer advocates, and federal regulators to develop guidance for pharmacists for comprehensive access to prescription drug information for the visually impaired. The guidelines will provide pharmacies a range of options, taking into account the challenges faced by smaller pharmacies.

Pending National legislation

<u>Optometric Equity in Medicaid Act, H.R. 121</u> A bill to amend Title XIX of the Social Security Act to require Medicaid coverage of optometrists. This bill is in the Energy and Commerce Committee and the Health Committee. Introduced 3/29/2011.

<u>The Fair Wages for Workers with Disabilities Act of 2011, HR 3086</u> A bill to phase out special wage certificates under the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 under which individuals with disabilities may be employed at sub-

minimum wages. Introduced 10/4/2011, it was referred to the Subcommittee on Workforce Protections.

New Hampshire : submitted by Kathleen Turner, Sight Center, Concord, NH.

An Act establishing a commission relative to Medicaid managed care, House bill 652-FN This bill establishes a commission to develop a managed care model for administering the Medicaid program and its enrollees to provide for managed care services for all Medicaid populations throughout New Hampshire consistent with the provision of 42 U.S.C. 1396u-2. The commission shall issue a request for proposals to enter into contracts with vendors of models. Once the model is selected by the commission and the contract is signed and approved by the governor and council, the department of health and human services shall implement the contract.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT Claudia Pattison, Chair May 11, 2012

Passed state legislation:

Massachusetts

Chapter 51 An act relative to students with disabilities in post-secondary education, employment, and independent living. The board shall provide a specialist teacher endorsement in transition services which shall include both coursework and field experience for previously licensed special education teachers and rehabilitation counselors to develop the competence necessary to service as transition coordinators to facilitate provision of a coordinated set of activities to adequately prepare students with disabilities to achieve successful transition to post-school activities, including further education, competitive employment and independent living. The rules and regulations shall be promulgated on or before September 1, 2012. Employed transition teachers who demonstrate competencies can receive a specialist teacher endorsement for 1 year after the promulgation of the rules and regulations.

NE/AER AWARDS ANNOUNCEMENT

It's never too early to start thinking about nominating someone for an NEAER award. This year's awards reception will be held at the NEAER conference in November in beautiful Newport, RI. Awards and descriptions are as follows:

NE/AER Award of Excellence for Direct Service to Children with Visual Impairment

The recipient of this award shall be an individual whose dedicated service and innovative approach have been outstanding in the field of education of children with visual impairments. The recipient must be a current AER member, be engaged in direct service to children with visual impairment and be directly involved in activities which substantially benefit or significantly contribute to the independence of children with visual impairment.

NE/AER Award of Excellence for Direct Service to Adults with Visual Impairment

The recipient of this award shall be an individual whose dedicated service and innovative approach have been outstanding in the field of vision rehabilitation. The recipient must be a current AER member, be engaged in direct service to adults with vision impairment and be involved in activities which substantially benefit or significantly contribute to the independence of adults with visual impairment.

NE/AER Team Award

This award recognizes the work of teams of NE/AER members which substantially benefit blind and visually impaired individuals in the Northeast area. The NE/AER Team Award pays tribute to members who work together to collaborate on significant professional projects. Teams can be as small as two individuals up to any number. To qualify for nomination, either the leadership or a majority of the members of the team must be AER members. Nominations may be made by any NE/AER member, including anyone on the team being nominated. It is the responsibility of the nominator to identify (and correctly spell the name) of each team member.

Distinguished Service Award

This award recognizes contributions of an individual or a group affiliated with, but not primarily involved in the education or rehabilitation of individuals with visual impairment. NE/AER offers this award to acknowledge the critical role that affiliated services, resource individuals and support systems play in the education and rehabilitation process. Emphasis is placed upon the recipient's history of working meaningfully in collaboration and mutual support of service providers and organizations for individuals with visual impairments.

Father Carroll Award

This award recognizes exemplary performance where efforts of the individual have had a significant impact on the lives of people with visual impairment. The recipient may be a professional or volunteer with a minimum of ten years of service. The recipient must be known as outstanding and have a reputation as an innovator, a mover, a shaker, and have a positive impact on the lives of people with visual impairment. Recipient must be current AER member. (Awarded in even numbered years.)

James J. Acton Memorial Award

The James J. Acton Memorial NE/AER Board Member Award, acknowledges the contributions of members of NE/AER who, through the years, have demonstrated fierce loyalty and dedication to the NE/AER mission. Nominees to receive the award must meet the following criteria: 1) Be currently active or retired member of NE/AER. 2) Have held membership in AER for at least fifteen years, ten of which were in NE/AER. 3) Served on the NE/AER Board as either an elected or nonvoting member. 4) Significantly inspired other members by actions such as presentations, writings, committee work and example. 5) Promoted the values of our international organization AERBVI.
